### STEWARDSHIP REPORT

During a recent interview, I was asked how long I had been working for Children's Choice. I responded, and the candidate said, wowthat's a long time! Why do you do it?

Why did I do it? What makes totally normal people want to go into social services. It's not for the money or the easy hours, it's not for the came to my mind. I started working, to provide for my family, but it restful and relaxing pace. So, what can it be? I think that all of us have was because of those two children and many more like them and my our defining moment that determined why we choose to enter or stay in relationship with my God, that I stay. I don't ever want to have a child social services. I remember mine vividly.

I was working with Children's Choice in the intake department. It was about 4pm on a Friday night, right before Thanksgiving. Everyone was focused on starting the holiday and getting out the door, worried about the traffic, shopping and other issues. The phone rang, and I took the call from the placing entity. The request was for a sibling group of two I pray that each of you find that driving force for what you do, that had come into care. They were about 6 and 8 years old, one male and one female. Both of their parents were in state custody for some reason and this was their first time into any system. The worker told me that they were sitting in the waiting room holding onto each other and visibly shaking. She went on to say that if we were not able to place them, that they would be taken to a shelter and would have to be placed separately. At that moment, in my mind's eye, I could see them sitting there, shaking, afraid and alone. I became a maniac. I tried every phone number that I had, called in every favor that I could, praying that I could find a place for them, some place, any place.

After several hours of trying, pushing hard and basically losing it, I had to admit that I was not able to place them. I failed them, and I was devastated. I am not a person who is easily brought to tears, in fact, I almost never cry, but that night I cried like a baby, a deep heart felt cry. I knew that I had failed them, they were now going to be separated into the system. I knew they were terrified to be torn apart, that their world was crashing down around them, and I knew it was my fault.

I did fail that day, but not the children on the other end of the phone. What I failed to see, was that there are other people in the "system", people who care for the little ones, and the not so little ones, just as much as I do and that we are never truly alone in this world. In my mind, I am sure that they were cared for and in my heart, I pray that

they were able to return to their family and that they forgot the reason that brought them into care, that somewhere out there, they are happy, in a safe place, and at peace.

So, when I was asked why I did this for so long, it was their picture that feel alone in the system. I was not able to help them that night, but since then, we have been able to help so many other children in the system, literally thousands. Even though I never met them, they stay with me in my heart as one of the driving forces that help to define what I hope my legacy will be.



Whatever you do, wherever you go, and whatever is going on in your life, please remember, God loves you and so do we.




Goal 1: To increase the number of children served in specialized, kinship and treatment foster care. The number of children in specialized, kinship and treatment increased in FY '17.




Goal 2: To increase the number of children served in kinship care. The number of children referred has increased in FY '17.




Goal 3: To increase the number of positive discharges for children in out-of-home care. The total number of discharges to Adoption, Reunification, and PLC has increased in FY '17.




Goal 4: To reduce the number of negative discharges for children in out-of-home care. The number of negatively discharged children has increased in FY '17.




Goal 5: To expand services to medically-fragile children. The number of medically fragile children referred has increased in the Med-4 category and decreased in the other categories.




Goal 6: To increase agency revenues.

# **COMMONWEALTH OF PENNSYLVANIA**

Two hundred and ten permanencies were consummated.



Nine permanent legal custodianships were awarded by Pennsylvania courts.



Sibling groups totaling 402 children were placed together.

Seven hundred and forty-four Pennsylvania children were cared for this year by 358 resource families.



Ninety-three Pennsylvania adoptions were finalized.



Ninety-seven Pennsylvania children were reunified with their parents.



Seven mothers and their babies were kept together in foster families.



Eleven emancipations were awarded.

# **STATE OF DELAWARE**



Thirty-three reunifications were achieved.



We conduct Parent Empowerment classes and Parent Aide programs to help to prevent children going into placement.



One hundred and fifty-six children were cared for by 73 Delaware resource parents.



Two emancipations were effected.



Seventy-three siblings were placed together this year, part of Children's Choice's emphasis on sustaining family ties.




Twenty-one adoptions were finalized this year in Delaware.

One hundred and eighty-four children were cared for by 126 Maryland resource parents.




Our Maryland respite program provided 1,558 nights of overnight respite, 842 day time hours and prevented entry into care for 71 children from 64 families.



Thirty-five siblings were placed together with us this year.


#### **SPECIAL EVENTS**
