





Goal 3: To increase the number of positive discharges for children in out-of-home care. The total number of discharges to other agencies has decreased in FY '18.





To reduce the number of negative discharges for children in out-of-home care. The number of negatively discharged children has increased in FY '18.




To expand services to medically-fragile children. The number of medically fragile children referred has stayed the same in Med-1 and decreased in all other categories.

COMMONWEALTH OF PENNSYLVANIA

One hundred and forty-eight permanencies were consummated.



Nine permanent legal custodianships were awarded by Pennsylvania courts.



Five hundred and fourteen Pennsylvania children were cared for this year by 240 resource families.

One hundred and one Pennsylvania adoptions were finalized.





Sibling groups totaling 168 children were placed together.

Thirty Pennsylvania children were reunified with their parents.



Seven mothers and their babies were kept together in foster families.



Three emancipations were awarded.

Thirty-two reunifications were achieved.

Fifty-five siblings were placed together this year, part of Children's Choice's emphasis on sustaining family ties.




